India today is a secular democratic republic - the Indian Constitution is the lodestar of our republic.

In 1947 India was an impoverished, illiterate country exploited by the British for their selfish interests. For years India was known more for malnourishment, hunger and disease and low life expectancy.

Today India is a burgeoning economy with a huge demographic advantage and a destination for investments, trade and commerce. India today is unrecognizable from the previous decades of penury and pestilence.

It is not as if India has rid herself of all the ills and malaise that dogged her. But India can justifiably proud of her achievements in various fields like health, education, science, technology and her position in the comity of nations
